Sonoco's Thanksgiving Donation Supports CTE Programs



Cocke County CTE Student Wins National FFA Title

Nate Mason, a junior at Cocke County High School, has made history as the FIRST and ONLY student to be recognized as a FFA **NATIONAL** champion within our district to date.

Mason won in the Animal Systems Division 3 category at the National FFA Agriscience Fair during the 97th National FFA Convention in Indianapolis, Indiana this October. His project, based on research conducted at his family's poultry operation, examined how light, temperature, and humidity affect chicken growth rates. After earning top honors at the state level, Mason advanced to nationals, where he submitted a manuscript and participated in interviews with judges to secure his win.

When asked about this undertaking, and his ultimate win, Nate stated, "My agriscience fair research has been an incredible opportunity to showcase who I am and what I'm passionate about. In today's world, countless opportunities are available, but it's up to you to seize them and make the most of what you're given. Sometimes it's scary to step out of your comfort zone, but you'll never know what can come out of it."

JAC Student Chosen to Lay Wreath at Tomb of Unknown Soldier

Gracelyn Davis, a CCHS senior in our CTE Jobs for America's Graduates (JAG) program, was selected as one of four students from around the nation to lay a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier during the National JAG Leadership Conference in Washington, D.C., held December 4-8, 2024. Gracelyn earned this prestigious honor by composing an essay as to why she wanted to participate in the ceremony. In her essay, she not only demonstrated her understanding of service, sacrifice, and patriotism, but she dedicated a large portion of it to her grandfather, a Vietnam War veteran.

The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, located in Arlington National Cemetery, serves as a memorial to unidentified American service members who gave their lives in war. Guarded 24/7 by the elite soldiers of the 3rd U.S. Infantry Regiment, known as "The Old Guard," the site stands as a powerful symbol of honor and respect.

Being selected for the wreath-laying ceremony was a once-in-a-lifetime moment, and Gracelyn shared her thoughts on the experience, saying, "Standing in front of the Tomb, knowing it represents so many who gave everything for our country, was overwhelming. 


CCHS Landscaping Class Spruces Up School Grounds
