The interactive simulations allowed students to gain practical insight into trades that are critical to our local and state economies, helping them visualize potential career paths they might not have otherwise considered.

The event wasn't just about experiencing the trades; it was also about leadership and service. In fact, a special group of CCHS CTE students volunteered their time and expertise throughout the day, serving as "Most

Certifying Success:

Cocke County CTE Students Earn Over 480 Industry Credentials in 24-25!

In today's rapidly evolving job market, Cocke County Schools' Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs celebrated a remarkable year for **industry certifications**, empowering students with essential skills and credentials for their future careers. **Industry certifications** are nationally recognized credentials that validate a student's mastery of specific, real-world job skills, making them highly desirable to employers and contributing significantly to their Ready Graduate status.

During the 2024-2025 school year, Cocke County CTE students achieved an outstanding milestone, earning **over 480 certifications** across 13 different critical industry areas! This incredible effort showcases their dedication and the high quality of our CTE programs.

The most frequently earned certifications included:

- OSHA-General Industry (129 certifications): Demonstrating crucial workplace safety knowledge.
- <u>ServSafe Food Handler</u> (117 certifications): Proving expertise in safe food handling practices for culinary and hospitality fields.
- Adult, Infant, and Child CPR/AED/First Aid (84 certifications): Equipping students with vital, life-saving emergency response skills.

This spring also saw 32 of our dedicated healthcare pathway students earn their highly sought-after Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) and Certified Clinical Medical Assistant (CCMA) credentials, preparing them for vital roles in the medical field.

These certifications provide our students with a significant competitive edge, directly linking classroom learning to immediate career opportunities and a strong foundation for continued education or training. Cocke County CTE is truly building a skilled and certified workforce, ready for what's next!



Breaking Non-Traditional Barriers: Cosby High Student Forges Her Own Path in Welding

As the end of the school year draws to a close, let's highlight students who are embracing "non-traditional" pathways within Career and Technical Education (CTE). One such inspiring student is rising senior, **Jaiden Carpenter**, a dedicated Cosby High School student who has chosen **Welding** as her *Program of Study*.

Each day, Jaiden demonstrated her commitment by traveling from Cosby High School to the Ben W. Hooper CTE Center on the Cocke County High School campus, utilizing the transportation provided by the district. Her journey into welding began after participating in "Rosie's Girls," a transformative summer program she attended after 8th grade.

Rosie's Girls is aptly named after "Rosie the Riveter," an iconic cultural symbol representing the American women who worked in factories and shipyards during World War II, many of whom produced munitions and war supplies. Rosie the Riveter became a symbol of feminism and women's economic power. (See graphic below to left.)

The summer program, *Rosie's Girls*, is hosted by local CTE teachers who are sponsored by **TCAT-Morristown** and aims to introduce more young women to high-demand industry trades. These include fields such as Welding, Machining, Industrial Maintenance/Electricity, and Architectural/Engineering Design – all areas traditionally underrepresented by women. Jaden's experience in *Rosie's Girls* clearly ignited a

passion, leading her to pursue welding with enthusiasm. In fact, she was recently interviewed by TCAT regarding her positive experience in the program. *Pictured right, Jaiden participates in the virtual interview.*




Smith, and Mr. Stephen Hodges, the group had the opportunity to witness real-world applications of the skills they are mastering in the classroom.



The **SkillsUSA** Tennessee State Leadership and Skills Conference (SLSC) is an annual event that showcases career and technical education. It involves competitions in various trade, technical, and leadership fields, providing opportunities for students to gain experience and network with industry professionals.

This year, the TN SLSC was held in Chattanooga from April 13-16, over 3,000 people participated. This included Career and Technical Education (CTE) students, advisors, industry partners, and community leaders.






Summer Learning Heats Up with CTE Bootcamps!
