Expectations and Rules:

Cell Phones/Communication Devices

Per school policy, all personal communication devices are to be put away during the school day. At the beginning of the block, student devices should be powered off and placed either in a backpack or bag.

Chromebooks

It is essential for students to bring their school-issued Chromebook or personal device with them each day to class. These devices should be charged each day and the charger should be brought to school with the device. We will use Chromebooks to complete a variety of coursework on Google Classroom throughout the semester. Chromebooks should only be used at times specified by the teacher and only for the purposes specified by the teacher.

Assigned Seats

All students have an assigned seat and are expected to remain in that seat unless directed to do so otherwise by the teacher. Seat assignments may be changed periodically throughout the semester. If you have a concern about your assigned seat, please speak privately with the teacher.

Make-up Assignments:

Make-up work is the students' responsibility. Make-up work request forms are in a basket at the back of the room. If you are absent, you must complete the form and return it to the correct basket. You will have 5 days upon your return to turn in any missed work. Work turned in after 5 days will not be accepted. I will NOT approach you and remind you of missed work. It is YOUR responsibility.

Late Assignments:

No late work will be accepted. You will be given ample time in class to finish daily assignments.

Quizzes and Tests:

In this class, we will be having 2 types of exams, regular quizzes and tests. Regular quizzes will occur at least twice a week. Teacher will notify students one day prior to giving quizzes. Tests will be at the end of a unit and will happen every 3-4 weeks. Quizzes and tests must be made up within the 5 day makeup work window. It is your responsibility to take the quiz/test and make it up, not mine!!

Required Materials: (bring every day to class)

- Textbook: United States Government and Civics, McGraw Hill. Textbooks must stay in my room as I only have a classroom set. However, if you wish to check out a textbook, you may do so. You are required to see me prior to leaving the classroom with a textbook.
- Chromebook or personal computer, charged and ready to use in class.
- Folder, paper, pencils, or pens.

Tardiness:

School policy will hold true in this class. If you are not in your seat when the bell rings, you are tardy. Even if it is one second after the bell rings, you are tardy.
