French 1 is an introduction to French language and culture. Students will cultivate reading, writing, listening, and speaking skills in French through a variety of activities. Weekly modules will cover a variety of vocabulary topics such as: introducing yourself, good manners in French, talking about sports and hobbies, family and the home, school subjects, describing someone's physical appearance and personality, etc. Students will learn to build sentences with regular and irregular verbs in the present and near future tenses.

Course Outline

Students will complete one module per week during the fall and spring semesters; 2 modules per week during the summer semester.

Module 1: Faisons Connaissance - Get to know your teacher and classmates, the layout of the online course, and some basics of the French language.

Module 2: J'aime - Discuss your likes and dislikes with regards to music, sports, and movies. Learn more about the French alphabet and numbers.

Module 3: À l'école - Explore vocabulary related to school subjects and supplies.

Module 5: La Famille - Explore vocabulary related to the family, learn 3 ways to say “my” in French, memorize conjugations of the irregular verb avoir (to have), learn to describe people with avoir and être.

Module 6: Les vêtements - Learn additional possessive adjectives and review family vocabulary, explore clothing vocabulary, memorize rules related to adjective agreement and placement.

Module 7: La Maison - Learn vocabulary related to the home, prepositions of location, and the irregular verb faire + expressions that use this verb.

Module 8: MIDTERM

Module 9: Allez! - Learn vocabulary related to places in a city or town, additional prepositions, how to use the verb aller (to go) to tell where someone is going or what they are going to do, learn additional verb phrases with faire and jouer to describe sports, games, and other free-time activities.

Module 10: Les temps, les saisons, et les activités - Review seasons and months of the year. Learn weather phrases and additional vocabulary related to hobbies. Write a paragraph about your favorite season. Share your favorite activities for each season with the class through a project.

Module 11: Au restaurant - Learn vocabulary related to dining out in France. Use the irregular verb prendre to make sentences about what people are ordering to eat and drink. Learn to use the verb avoir + faim or soif to tell that people are hungry or thirsty.

Module 12: Les Repas - Learn terms for breakfast, lunch, dinner, and snack + some foods you might find at each meal. Learn the verbs associated with mealtimes. Memorize -ir verb conjugations. Use partitive articles to indicate “some” of a food or drink item.

Module 13: Faisons les courses - Learn about shopping for food in France: vocabulary for small specialty stores and the items you can find there. Practice ordering in a French bakery. Practice
